- 93% are done as elective (see more detail below)
- .3% because of possible fetal health or abnormalities
- .3% due to the mother's health problems or danger of life loss
- .1% due to rape or incest

Reasons Women Choose Abortion:

- 32% Too young or not ready for responsibility
- 21% Economic
- 16% Avoid Adjusting Life
- 22% Single or in Poor Relationship (includes Pressures from Others)
- 8% Enough Children already
- 1% Sex of Child or Selective Reduction
